



Dear Fifth Grade Families,

In Unit 8, students will work on the following fifth grade Common Core standards in the Number and Operations –Fractions (NF) domain.

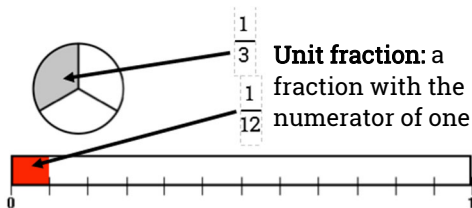
5.NF.7a-c	<p>Apply and extend previous understandings of division to divide unit fractions by whole numbers and whole numbers by unit fractions.</p> <p>a. Interpret division of a unit fraction by a non-zero whole number, and compute such quotients. <i>For example, create a story context for $\frac{1}{3} \div 4$, and use a visual fraction model to show the quotient. Use the relationship between multiplication and division to explain that $\frac{1}{3} \div 4 = \frac{1}{12}$ because $\frac{1}{12} \times 4 = \frac{1}{3}$.</i></p> <p>b. Interpret division of a whole number by a unit fraction, and compute such quotients. <i>For example, create a story context for $4 \div \frac{1}{5}$, and use a visual fraction model to show the quotient. Use the relationship between multiplication and division to explain that $4 \div \frac{1}{5} = 20$ because $20 \times \frac{1}{5} = 4$.</i></p> <p>c. Solve real world problems involving division of unit fractions by non-zero whole numbers and division of whole numbers by unit fractions, e.g., by using visual fraction models and equations to represent the problem. <i>For example, how much chocolate will each person get if 3 people share $\frac{1}{2}$ lb of chocolate equally? How many $\frac{1}{3}$-cup servings are in 2 cups of raisins?</i></p>

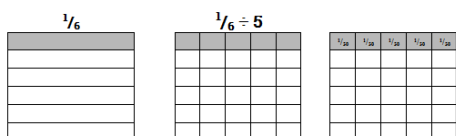

$$3 \div \frac{1}{5} = 15$$



$$\frac{1}{6} \div 5$$

$$\frac{1}{6} \times \frac{1}{5} = \frac{1}{30}$$

Continue to for ways to engage your child in solving real-life scenarios that use multiplication and division of fractions. Ask questions like these to help your child become a productive mathematical thinker:

- How does drawing a model help you understand division of fractions?
- What is the most efficient way to divide a whole number by a fraction?
- What is a real life scenario you could apply division of fractions?
